Jigsaw – Physical contact

The Great Fire of London

10 On Sunday 2nd September 1666, a fire began in a
19 bakery on Pudding Lane in London. The baker had
30 forgotten to put out the fire he had used to bake
39 his bread. The fire soon spread to other buildings.

In 1666, buildings in London were made of wood
and built very close together, which meant the fire
could spread easily. There were no firefighters so
people had to try to put the fire out themselves,
using buckets of water from the River Thames.

91 The fire carried on spreading on Monday and
97 Tuesday. Luckily, on Wednesday, the wind
105 stopped and the fire was finally put out.

114 The fire destroyed large parts of London, which had117 to be rebuilt.
